Committee Charge: The Council seeks to identify and discuss potential barriers to research taking place in the college and to provide guidance in the following areas: Implementation of the research portion of the HHS strategic plan; set specific goals and action plans; Identify and help develop mechanisms to promote increased funding; Promote faculty by encouraging and reviewing awards; Increase visibility of the college, including identifying cores of strength; Identify and help develop mechanisms to promote increased collaboration; Identify and pursue funding for shared equipment needs; Review HHS and University services available to faculty for research; and Identify potential cluster hires with a core in the college.

I. **Committee Activities Accomplished since February 2025:**

- **HHS Research Series: Books** This panel discussion focused on insights into writing books. - **Health of the Forces Symposium-** April 1, 2024, 3pm-5pm, John Purdue Room, Marriott Hall- This event was part of an effort on campus, the Health of the Forces Initiative, to support research on the health of those who serve in and support the military forces and their families. Researchers from multiple colleges with interests in these health-related topics were invited to meet with colleagues who have similar interests and to foster new collaborations. Thirty-five people attended this event.
- **Health of the Forces: A Funding Program to Support Pilot Studies – Spring 2025** Funding program to support pilot research studies investigating topics associated with the health and well-being of members of the military, veterans and their families. The project had to be collaborative in nature, involving at least two Purdue faculty members who are from different colleges.

Committee Activities since April 2025:

During its meeting on April 23, 2025, the committee approved revisions in the titles, descriptions, learning outcomes, prerequisites, and/or registration restrictions for six CSR courses and one HTM course. The committee also discussed grade requirements for courses and majors across HHS and learned about new online sources of information about student statistics.

During its meeting on September 18, 2025, the committee:

1. Approved a name change for the NUTR major (to "Biomedical Nutrition Sciences" NUSC); approved changes in curricula for four HTM majors (HTMT, FCPL, REMG, SELL); approved the expiration of one optional HTM concentration (HFDM); approved changes in course descriptions, learning outcomes, registration restrictions, and/or prerequisites for five CSR courses and three HTM courses;

2. Continued discussion of grade Began discussion of grade requirements for courses and majors across HHS and considered a slate of topics for future discussion.

I. Committee Activities in Progress:

The committee will determine via email the topic of our next discussion, choosing from (so far) options of: Grade requirements for courses and majors; HHS undergraduates and Purdue in Indianapolis; “non-transcript” educational opportunities; undergraduate research opportunities and challenges; AI and information literacy; ADA Title II accessibility of course materials.

The committee will meet again on October 23 to discuss at least one of these topics, and to consider all proposals that are received by the deadline stated in the committee’s document on its policies and procedures.

Committee Charge: This committee, which serves primarily as a liaison between the faculty and the dean, may convene to discuss any and all matters that affect the responsibilities, rights, and welfare of the college's faculty. The committee meets with the dean at least once each semester to discuss topics of special concern to the faculty. Working in collaboration with the dean, the committee establishes a process for the regular review of deans and heads. In addition, the committee reviews the college's bylaws every five years.

I. Committee Activities Accomplished since February 2025:

- a. The Faculty Affairs Committee meets with the HHS Dean and his designee once per semester. The Faculty Affairs Committee met with Dean Bowman and Senior Associate Dean Berndt on May 9, 2025 to discuss topics of faculty concern. This meeting focused on four broad talking points: Spring HHS Faculty Meeting (and Awards presentations), status of department head/faculty searches, government climate around funding, international students/graduate students, and clinical site agreement processing.

- b. The FAC has also met with the HHS Dean on September 4, 2025 to fulfill the bylaws described above and to review the committee's plans for the upcoming fall HHS Faculty Meeting. We discussed the meeting and also our plans for the upcoming year. We discussed re-evaluation of the bylaws incorporating our HHS values to the bylaws and calls for all HHS faculty to consider bylaws updates.
- c. Schedule Fall 2026 and Spring 2026 faculty meetings –discussed and decided on scheduling these earlier in the semester to allow more time for action and forward movement within the semester and reporting the following semester on accomplishments. Year 2026 will be a transitional year for the dates. We have also added the faculty spotlights at request by the Dean and identified candidates from the departments.
- d. Election of new chair and appointment of several new committee members, reformation of agenda and by-laws sub-committees
- e. Proposed goals for 2025-2025 (see below)

II. Committee Activities in Progress/Plans for the 2025-2026 Academic Year:

- a. Review of By-laws and solicitation of amendments.
 - a. FAC committee proposes that the bylaws be amended to transition HHS faculty meeting planning to the Deans office with FAC review and approval. –justification is that the Dean has oversight of the college and knowledge of scope for what to share with the college. FAC were generally carrying out these wishes so this will streamline the process.
 - b. FAC committee proposes review of bylaws with attention to the shared values that HHS want reflected, all members of HHS will be welcomed to participate –recent state laws have impacted the bylaws and faculty need to consider how current HHS bylaws may be improved.
- b. FAC committee proposes gathering ideas for how the FAC can facilitate closer communication of faculty concerns and needs to the dean
 - a. FAC should serve as a liaison between faculty and HHS administration. We may be more effective in doing that with reconsideration of how faculty interact with the FAC
